UNDERSTANDING THE KNEE JOINT

THE KNEE JOINT IS A COMPLEX HINGE JOINT THAT CONNECTS THE THIGH BONE (FEMUR) TO THE SHIN BONE (TIBIA) AND IS CRUCIAL FOR FACILITATING MOVEMENT. IT ALLOWS FOR FLEXION AND EXTENSION, WHICH ARE ESSENTIAL FOR WALKING, RUNNING, JUMPING, AND VARIOUS ATHLETIC ENDEAVORS. THE KNEE IS CLASSIFIED AS A SYNOVIAL JOINT, WHICH MEANS IT IS SURROUNDED BY A CAPSULE FILLED WITH SYNOVIAL FLUID, AIDING IN LUBRICATION AND REDUCING FRICTION DURING MOVEMENT.

IN ADDITION TO ITS PRIMARY FUNCTIONS, THE KNEE JOINT ALSO PROVIDES STABILITY AND WEIGHT-BEARING CAPABILITIES. THE KNEE MUST SUPPORT THE ENTIRE BODY'S WEIGHT DURING ACTIVITIES SUCH AS STANDING OR CLIMBING STAIRS. IT IS, THEREFORE, DESIGNED WITH A COMBINATION OF STRONG LIGAMENTS, TENDONS, AND CARTILAGE TO ENSURE BOTH FLEXIBILITY AND STRENGTH.

KEY COMPONENTS OF THE KNEE

2. LIGAMENTS

LIGAMENTS ARE STRONG BANDS OF TISSUE THAT CONNECT BONES TO OTHER BONES, PROVIDING STABILITY TO THE KNEE JOINT. THE MAIN LIGAMENTS IN THE KNEE INCLUDE:

- **ANTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (ACL):** PREVENTS FORWARD MOVEMENT OF THE TIBIA RELATIVE TO THE FEMUR.
- **POSTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (PCL):** PREVENTS BACKWARD MOVEMENT OF THE TIBIA RELATIVE TO THE FEMUR.
- **MEDIAL COLLATERAL LIGAMENT (MCL):** PROVIDES STABILITY TO THE INNER SIDE OF THE KNEE.
- **LATERAL COLLATERAL LIGAMENT (LCL):** PROVIDES STABILITY TO THE OUTER SIDE OF THE KNEE.

3. CARTILAGE

CARTILAGE IS A SMOOTH, RUBBERY TISSUE THAT COVERS THE ENDS OF BONES IN THE KNEE JOINT, ALLOWING FOR SMOOTH MOVEMENT AND CUSHIONING DURING WEIGHT-BEARING ACTIVITIES. THE TWO MAIN TYPES OF CARTILAGE IN THE KNEE ARE:

- **ARTICULAR CARTILAGE:** COVERS THE SURFACES OF THE FEMUR, TIBIA, AND PATELLA, REDUCING FRICTION DURING MOVEMENT.
- **MENISCI:** TWO CRESCENT-SHAPED CARTILAGE PADS (MEDIAL AND LATERAL MENISCUS) THAT ACT AS SHOCK ABSORBERS AND STABILIZE THE JOINT.

4. TENDONS

TENDONS ARE TISSUES THAT CONNECT MUSCLES TO BONES. IN THE KNEE, SEVERAL KEY TENDONS ARE INVOLVED IN MOVEMENT:

- **QUADRICEPS TENDON:** CONNECTS THE QUADRICEPS MUSCLE TO THE PATELLA.
- **PATELLAR TENDON:** CONNECTS THE PATELLA TO THE TIBIA AND PLAYS A ROLE IN KNEE EXTENSION.

COMMON KNEE INJURIES

THE KNEE IS SUSCEPTIBLE TO VARIOUS INJURIES DUE TO ITS COMPLEX STRUCTURE AND THE STRESSES PLACED ON IT DURING PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES. SOME OF THE MOST COMMON KNEE INJURIES INCLUDE:

1. ACL TEARS

ALSO KNOWN AS "JUMPER'S KNEE," PATELLAR TENDONITIS IS AN OVERUSE INJURY THAT RESULTS FROM REPETITIVE STRESS ON THE KNEE. IT IS COMMON IN ATHLETES INVOLVED IN SPORTS THAT REQUIRE JUMPING.

4. LIGAMENT SPRAINS

SPRAINS OF THE MCL OR LCL CAN OCCUR DUE TO DIRECT IMPACT OR EXCESSIVE FORCE ON THE KNEE. THESE INJURIES CAN RANGE FROM MILD TO SEVERE, DEPENDING ON THE EXTENT OF THE LIGAMENT DAMAGE.

TREATMENT AND REHABILITATION
